The Puggy Hunter Memorial Scholarship Scheme

Nursing and Allied Health Scholarship and Support Scheme: Allied Health Clinical Placement

This scholarship supports eligible allied health students to undertake a clinical placement in a regional, rural or remote Australian community. Scholarship funding will be for a maximum of six weeks whilst the scholarship recipient is undertaking their clinical placement. The scholarship recipient will receive funding towards travel to and from the placement location, accommodation costs and living expenses. Scholarship applicants must be enrolled in an approved/accredited course in an eligible allied health profession.
