- Human rights-based approach to specialist service provision under the NDIS?
- Aim: Beginning assessments by focusing on human rights fulfilment and infringements based on the lived experiences and world views of people with disability.
- <u>Not</u> transformative!
- Prioritising ameliorative interventions (individual-level) above restrictions or limitations on the human rights of a person with disability.

NDIS an empowering setting: a reflection

- People with disability in Australia have access to individualised funding for disability-specific support needs via an insurance scheme.
- Federal and state legislation is in place to protect the rights and responsibilities of people with disability in Australia.
