Clinical Seminar Diddley Bo: Music, Poetry and the Analytic Experience

The APS Psychoanalytically Oriented Psychology Interest Group



The diddley bo is a simple single stringed instrument that began many Blues guitarists' journey into music. I use the diddley bo as a simple symbol to begin an analytic exploration of music, and meaning, over the last century. I link an understanding of music with reverie and early bodily experiences, brushed by Aboriginal Dot paintings and expanded in Bion's Grid.

I also draw on two poetic traditions, Coleridge's 'Rime of the Ancient Mariner', and the American post-slavery legend of 'Stagger Lee'. The states of mind represented in these poetic traditions can help us to understand popular music and Rock, and persistent social apprehensions towards them. Along the way we can enjoy quite a range of music to help us think about these ideas. The paper ends with a raw Blues song played by Eddie 'One String' Jones. Eddie's song vividly brings to life analytic material resonant with clinical work.
