Keynote Speaker: Professor Larry Leitner

Larry, while working in the clinical department of the Miami University Psychology Dept, Oxford, Ohio, also has maintained a clinical practice. MESSAGE FROM BRIAN GAINES.

I have just posted an article on "Visualizing logical aspects of conceptual structures" in HTML and PDF to http://cpsc.ucalgary.ca/~gaines/reports (last article at bottom of the "*Knowledge Representation and Acquisition*" section).

It is for a special issue on visual languages for logic rather than targeted on a PCP audience but, since it cites Kelly heavily and much of the material is PCP-based, so it may be of interest to those on this list.

The article analyses construct systems in terms of Euler diagrams, Venn diagrams, semantic networks, grids and conceptual spaces, and shows that the different representations are logically equivalent but provide complementary perspectives on the construct systems.

We have previously reported analyses of Kelly's (1955) model of "networks of constructs" based on his logical relations of ordination and opposition. What is new in this articles is a technique implementing Kelly's remarks that construct poles can also be treated as elements, construed by the construct system of which they are part. This self-construction enables semantic networks to be converted to grids, and back again, without having to introduce specific instances of 'elements.'

When principal component analysis is used to analyze the grid it generates an equivalent multi-dimensional space, illustrating Kelly's exposition of the

"geometry of psychological space," and connecting it to Gärdenfors' recent models of "conceptual space." This transformation is also reversible. One can tessellate the space with a multi-dimensional Euler diagram and recover the original semantic network.

Hopefully, the visual representations of these various transformations make the underlying psychological processes more comprehensible than any amount of text, logic and mathematics!
